

# Again Asks Seat in Jewish Conference

The Jewish People's Committee in a letter to all elected delegates of the American Jewish Conference yesterday backed the Conference as the body for all-out Jewish unity but appealed to the Jewish leaders for a place in the Conference.

The Jewish People's Committee, which represents hundreds of thousands of Jewish trade unionists and fraternalists, was recently barred from the Conference by a few individuals who control its election apparatus, the letter stated.

It charged that these persons, including Louis Lipsky and Louis Segal of the National Jewish Alliance, and Hayim Greenberg of the Poale Zion, "continue to stand in the way of all-inclusive unity."

"Like the Bourbons of old," the letter continued, "they have forgotten nothing and have learned nothing. In the midst of this life and death struggle for Jewish survival, they persist in carrying over their narrow and sectarian views and have so far succeeded in barring from participation in the Conference the Jewish People's Committee."

## ACHIEVE THIS AIM

The letter urged further: "In the interests of the Jewish people of America and of the world, the American Jewish Conference must bring about unity, and we hope that you, a delegate to the Conference, will do everything in your power to help achieve this aim."

In addition to the letter, the Jewish People's Committee is circulating a petition addressed to the Conference among the Jewish people, urging that their delegates be seated.

The letter to delegates sets forward the Committee's program as follows:

(1) Enhancing the Jewish con-

tribution for the quickest possible winning of the war.

(2) For the outlawing of anti-Semitism in the United States, "as a Nazi instrument of treason to America."

(3) For unity of American Jews with Jews of the Soviet Union.

(4) "All possible aid to the fighting Yishuv of Palestine," and a guarantee of the national rights of the Jews in Palestine.

(5) To help secure the democratic and national rights of the Jews the world over."
